

Cuba Revolutionary News—Seizure of a Vessel by Passengers—A Spanish Vessel in Pursuit—Cuban Military Organization.

HAVANA, March 27.—The United States flagship Contosook, Rear Admiral Hest commanding, has arrived here from Key West.

The report published in this city a few days ago that a heavy battle had been fought between the troops under Gen. Puelo and the insurgents, in the eastern department, at some point on the road from Remedios to Moron, is untrue. There was only a slight skirmish between the Spanish troops and eight hundred insurgents.

The steamer Comanditario, the regular packet between Havana and Cardenas, left this port on Tuesday evening last for her regular trip to Cardenas, carrying about forty passengers. Nothing was heard of the steamer afterwards until to-day, and fears were entertained for her safety. The news received to-night, however, announces that several of the passengers of this steamer, who had lately been prisoners in Fort Cabanas, threatened the crew, took possession of the steamer, and disembarked the lady passengers, a portion of the crew and the captain at Roques Key, near Cardenas. The Comanditario then proceeded, it is supposed, to Nassau, N. P. The disembarked crew and passengers were subsequently taken up at Roques Key and carried to Cardenas.

The steamer Comanditario carried one day's supply of coal. Vessels which arrived to-day report seeing the Comanditario off Styrup Key, under sail. Others report seeing her anchored off Bahama Banks, one hundred miles from Nassau. A Spanish man-of-war has gone in pursuit of her.

Captain General Dulce has appointed Mirano to be Governor of Trinidad, in place of Palmo.

Intelligence has been received from Sagua that a party of young Cubans organized themselves into a military company, with the intention of joining the insurgents, but were betrayed by one of their number, and all, including Meduro, their reputed leader, were imprisoned.

The Havana journals publish dispatches from all parts of the island. The news received is favorable to the government. Reports of several skirmishes between the troops and the insurgents have been received. The steamer Comercio has been armed and fitted out as a gunboat, and to-day sailed for Cardenas to intercept the expedition which is expected from Nassau. The Peruvian monitor remained four days at Puerto Navajo, four leagues from Gibria, during which time the crew was engaged in cutting wood for the purpose of supplying steam.

Advices from Port-au-Prince to the 18th inst., report Salvave in a precarious situation. Owing to the state of his finances, the navy has not received any pay for three months, and there is a feeling of murmuring at the capital against Salvave. The blacks are jealous of the whites, and there are fears of assassinations. A petition is in circulation praying for a blockade of the port of Aux Cayes.

FURTHER FROM CUBA.

HAVANA, March 28.—The rest of the passengers and crew of the steamer Comanditario have arrived at Cardenas. They denounce the parser and engineer as leaders of a plot for seizing the vessel.

Two men were killed in the streets of Havana to-day, and six were arrested for uttering seditious cries. E. R. Codrington, American consular agent at Gebara, has been brought a prisoner to Havana.
