

The Cuban Insurrection.

HAVANA, Feb 23

The city is quiet. Three thousand troops leave for the interior to-morrow.

The journals urge the volunteers to maintain their discipline and rely on the Government.

Salutes were fired yesterday in honor of Washington. The people in the suburbs were greatly frightened, thinking there was a disturbance in the city.

The rebels are burning the plantations in Villa Clara and Jagua Districts. In the latter district 36 cane plantations have been laid waste.

Dates from Neuvas 18th have been received. A large expedition put to sea under Governor Lesca. It consisted of 2500 men, including cavalry, with howitzers, guns, horses, provisions and 140 rounds of artillery ammunition. It is supposed the destination is Guananga, where the rebels have fortified themselves.

The schooner Kate Ranger has been prohibited from loading, because she was suspected of being engaged in carrying supplies to the rebels, and is going to Matanzas.

A decree is to be issued imposing export duty from the 1st of March next of 50 cts. per box and \$1.25 per hhd. on sugar, \$1.00 per bale on tobacco, and fifty cents per thousand on segars and an additional of five per cent. on all duties on imports, and 25 per cent. on all internal taxes, the proceeds of which to be paid weekly to the Spanish bank to secure an advance of eight millions of dollars to the Government.
