The Spanish Consul in an interview with U. S. Marshai Barlow this P. M., stated he had received positive information that a steamer and several small sailing vessels are being fitted out to take volunteers and arms to the Cuban insurgents, and demanded that such expeditions be stopped. He also called the Marshal's attention to the various recruiting stations of Cubans in this city, and furnished a list of them. The Marshal yesterday afternoon received orders from Secretary Fish to prevent any possible breach of the neutrality laws in relation to Cuba.
