The Governor of South Carolina has vetoed a bill loaning the credit of the State to the Greenville & Columbia railroad.

The green eyed monster was the cause of a man in New York shooting his loved one yesterday.

An insane woman, who was possessed with the idea that she was sent by God to kill Andrew Johnson, was arrested in the corridor of the White House Wednesday evening. She had a loaded double barreled pistol with her.

Rev. Henry A. Wise, Jr., died in Richmond, Va., Wednesday.

Sol Aaron, the pugilist, is under arrest in Boston for participating in the fight at Lynnfield.

Weston is progressing—backwards.

An announcement that the Attorney General has ordered the case against Judge Fullerton to be discontinued, has caused a decided sensation in legal circles.

The police force of New York have received a warning that inefficient officers must soon make room for those who will discharge their duties in a manner more satisfactory to the Commissioner.

Another steamboat race is taking place between the City of Paris and Russia, which left New York about the same time Wednesday.

Hon. James T. Brady's funeral took place yesterday forenoon. The Cathedral was filled to its utmost capacity, the legal profession of New York being very largely represented.

News from Athens states that the irritation against France is so great that the sailors of the French vessels of war cruising in front of that city have been forbidden to go on shore, so as to prevent a fight between them and the Greek population.

The case of Pike, the Fitchburg wife poisoner, was before the court yesterday, but was adjourned to the 28th inst.

John Mitchell, of Sutton, 35 years old, is under arrest for attempting to murder his wife by throwing a bottle of kerosene oil in the fire, burning her shockingly.

The Secretary of the Navy sent to the House yesterday voluminous correspondence relative to affairs in Paraguay, but we find nothing of importance not heretofore communicated.

The telegraph destroyed by the insurgents in Cuba has been restored.

It is said the leaders of the revolutionists in the districts of Cienfuegos, Villa Clara and Trinidad are Adolfo Cavada and his brother Frederick. The former was recently the American Vice Consul at Cienfuegos, and the latter Consul at Trinidad.
