

Spanish and Cuban Leaders.

The Havana correspondent of the New York Times says : In the matter of leaders the boasted superiority of the Spaniards over the Cubans is mere bosh, except as the persons of their representatives in Washington are concerned. Generally the Cubans appear to have the advantage. The war or difficulty has, to the present time, produced only one really representative and able man, Don Carlos Manuel Cespedes, the chief of the revolutionists, but his actions are so shrouded in mystery as to make an impartial judgment impossible. Neither Spaniards or Cubans have produced any military man of renown, excepting in secondary positions, such as Lopez, Queralta, Cavada and Bombela among the insurgents, and Colonels Acosta and Boet, both native Cubans I believe, among the Spaniards. "Too many cooks spoil the broth," and that may be the reason why so many of Dulce's proclamations are so excessively stupid, appear so much out of place, and are so fearfully inappropriate.
