

Neutrality Measures.

Atlantic journals of May 15th express confidence that the action of the Government in reference to the Cuban insurrection is in strict accordance with the principles laid down in the law of neutrality. Secretary Fish spoke freely of his settled intention to stop all sorts of filibustering expeditions, under whatever name or shape they try to hide themselves. A number of vessels at different ports, suspected of being in the Cuban interest, were closely watched by our revenue cutters and naval forces. But Secretary Fish complains of the bloody and blind policy of Spain towards Cuba, and says that with such a power the keeping of neutrality is not an easy thing. Señor Roberts, the Spanish Minister at Washington, makes no complaint at the course our Government is pursuing.
