New York, July 12.—The brig A. Eldred, which left here on the 23d of June with arms, ammunition and 125 men for Cuba, landed the arms up a river in Cuba, near Hernandez. The cholera had just then broken out in the camp of the patriots, in consequence one hundred and twenty of the expedition party refused to enlist in the Cuban ranks. Even after they had been offered a bounty of one thousand dollars per head in gold, they preferred to wait till the close of the sickly season. On the second day after their arrival, however, the Spaniards made a descent upon Hernandez, and posted themselves on the adjoining heights, but the Americans, under Lieut. Clarnoy, drove them from their position without the loss of a man. After this victory they re-embarked unmolested, and returned safely to New York on Saturday, with the exception of two men named Walsh and Miller, of Petersburg, Virginia, who died of cholera on the way.
