

From Cuba.

Telegraphic communication between Havana and Sagua-la-Grande and Villa Clara, which had been destroyed by the revolutionists, has been restored.

It is reported that the leaders of the revolution in the sugar districts of Cienfuegos, Villa Clara and Trinidad are Adolfo Cavada and his brother, Frederick Cavada. The former was recently Vice-Consul at Cienfuegos, and was removed at the request of Captain-General Lersundi. He was colonel of a Philadelphia regiment of Zouaves during the civil war in the United States. The latter was, until last week, the American Consul at Trinidad de Cuba, and has just resigned.

Arrests continue to be made, by the military and the police, of suspected parties in Havana and throughout the island. Among the prisoners are many well-known planters, merchants and lawyers. The English Consul at Cardenas is also among those arrested.

La Prensa says that at present Jiminez, Planita and Cassanova are the only rebel leaders in the Central Department. None of the other chiefs with their men have appeared. The number of the rebel forces at Camarones is supposed to be three thousand.
