

CAPTAIN GENERAL DULCE AND THE CUBAN JUNTA IN NEW YORK.—The following is an extract from a private letter dated Matanzas, April 19, 1869:

The Governor has called a meeting for this evening with the intention, it is said, of compelling the people to sign a protest against the proceedings of the Junta in New York and to signify their adherence to the government. I wish you to make this known in advance that the newspapers may publish it, and that "forewarned you may be forearmed." Confiscations continue in our midst. The residences of Messrs. Julian Arango and Gonzalo Alfonso have the seals of the government upon them. Every room in the house of the latter, as well as in the dwellings of the Marquis of Montelo, have been similarly marked, because at one time Don Jose Mestre, whose property has been confiscated, occupied them.
