Spanish Scrutiny of the Mails—No Case for American Interference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—A paragraph was recently published that Consul-General PLUMB had informed this Government of an apprehension that the Spanish authorities in Cuba would interfere with the United States mails. No such interference, however, has taken place, and therefore no case has occurred requiring any direct action on our part. There is no doubt that persons at Havana are subject to search where there is reason to suspect they are in possession of correspondence inimical to Spain, and from this has probably arisen the apprehension expressed by Mr. PLUMB.
