

CUBA.

Telegraphic news from Havana to-day shows that the work of burning the sugar crop in the fields is prosecuted by the insurgents with vigor. Four plantations near Santiago, one at Trinidad and ten near Cienfuegos, have been burned since the 1st inst. Among the latter, it is said, is that of Mr. POUVERT, of New-York. The Civil Governor of Santiago proclaims the slaughter of 280 insurgents, and offers clemency to such as may submit, and threatens the chastisement of all revolutionists captured. The Captain-General has pardoned 200 political prisoners. A commission from the insurgent Government, it is understood in Havana, has arrived in Caracas, to induce the Government of Venezuela to recognize Cuban belligerency, and to permit recruiting for the Cuban army. The suffering and destitution in consequence of the cholera and smallpox at Santiago is intense.
