Resolved, That as a means of expressing and giving effect to our earnest interest in the prosperity and honor of the institution, we recommend the formation of an association of the Alumni of Union College residing in the city of New York and its vicinity, and that a reunion of the Alumni be held in the month of April ensuing.

A committee, consisting of Howard Potter, Jesse C. Smith, Silas B. Brownell, W. H. H. Moore, General Daniel Butterfield, Rev. Dr. Rabb, J. W. Buckland and Professor Samuel D. Tillman, was appointed to perfect arrangements for the organization and to make arrangements for a general meeting of the Alumni, in accordance with the foregoing resolutions.
