

SANTIAGO DE CUBA.

A Flaming Proclamation of the Commandant of a Petty Town—Great Feat of Arms, Which Only Reports the Enemy's Losses.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 8, 1893.

The military commandant of Baracoa, in a communication dated the 2d, states that with a force of regulars and volunteers he had beaten 150 rebels, under the Mexican chief Francisco Tamayo, well intrenched at Veguita, after a fight of two hours. The troops captured the insurgent Colonel José Bucelo, a native of Havana, who landed with the expedition in Imías, and had him shot. The other losses of the enemy amounted to twenty-nine killed and many wounded. The losses sustained by the troops have not transpired. The commandant, Don Julian Gonzalez Farrado, issued a flaming proclamation to the inhabitants of Joló, warning them not to render any shelter or aid to the chiefs Ismayo and Policarpo

Rustan, or any of the foreigners in their command, under penalty of being immediately shot without mercy. They are further threatened of having their houses burnt if, on arrival of his troops, any of them should be found unoccupied; and whosoever does not present himself within forty-eight hours before the said functionary will be considered as an enemy and shall be tried by a council of war.
