

FROM CUBA.

Telegraphic Communication Restored—A Philadelphia Colonel Leading the Revolutionists.

HAVANA, Feb. 11.—Telegraphic communication between Havana and Sagua La Grande and Villa Clara, which had been destroyed by the Revolutionists, has been restored.

It is reported that the leaders of the revolution in the sugar districts of Cienfuegos, Villa Clara and Trinidad, are Adolfo Cavada, and his brother, Frederick, the former recently American Vice Consul at Cienfuegos, and removed at the request of Larnandi; the latter, was, until last week, the American Consul at Trinidad de Cuba, and has just resigned. He was lieutenant colonel of a Philadelphia regiment of Zouaves during the civil war in America.

Numerous Arrests—Needs of the Government—Meeting of Merchants.

HAVANA, Feb. 11—Evening.—Arrests continue to be frequently made by the military and police of suspected parties on this island. Among the prisoners are many well known planters, merchants and lawyers. The English Consul at Cardenas is also among those arrested.

The *Press* says that at present Jimenez, Planita and Cuanova are the only rebel leaders in the Central Department. None of the other chiefs are with them.

The number of the rebel forces at Camarenz is supposed to be 400.

A meeting of merchants was held at the Palace last night, to raise funds for the government, but no decisive result was attained. A mixed commission of merchants and planters was appointed, with instructions to report a feasible plan for supplying the needs of the government quickly and securely, without imposing additional burdens upon the middle or poorer classes.
