

CONDENSED CABLE NEWS.

A banquet was given to the English Ministry on Thursday. Mr. Gladstone made a speech. He reviewed the progress already made in carrying into effect the resolves for the dis-establishment of the Irish Church, and declared his intention of proceeding speedily and prudently, encouraged by a constitutional knowledge.

Ten thousand troops are to sail from Madrid, for Cuba, immediately.

Telegraphic communication between Havana and Sanga la Grande and Ville Clara, which had been destroyed by the revolutionists, has been restored.

It is reported that the leaders of the revolution in the sugar districts of Cienfuegos, Villa Clara, and Trinidad are Adolpho Cavada and his brother Frederick Cavada. The former was recently American vice consul at Cienfuegos, and was removed at the request of Captain General Lersundi. He was Colonel of a Philadelphia regiment of Zouaves during the civil war in America. The latter was until last week the American consul at Trinidad, and has just resigned.

Arrests continue to be frequently made by the military and police of suspected parties in Havana and throughout Cuba. Among the prisoners are many well known planters, merchants, and lawyers. The English consul at Cardenas is also among those arrested.

The *Breusa* says that at the present Jimines, Planita, and Cassanova are the only rebel leaders in the Central Department. None of the other chiefs with their men have appeared.

The number of the rebel forces at Camarones is supposed to be 3,000.
