CUBA.

Reported Victory by General Puello—Arrival at Nuevitas—A Sharp Engagement on New Year's Day.

HAVANA, Jan. 28.—The *Diario* of this morning announces the capture of Guaimaro, the capital of the insurgents, by the forces under General PUELLO, after a severe combat; and that PUELLO is now returning to the coast on account of a scarcity of provisions.

....A steamer arrived to-day from Nuevitas. She confirms the arrival at that place of General PUELLO, on the 22d inst. Letters of a late date received from Puerto Principe make no mention of the taking of Guaimaro by PUELLO, although they state that his troops took strong positions in the surrounding country and occupied Guaimaro-Campaña, the old site of Guaimaro. The *Diario* publishes a report by an eye-witness of a heavy engagement on the 1st of January, which resulted in a great destruction of life. During the night the insurgents constructed a line of intrenchments, and the Spaniards, being unaware of this fact, were surprised with a heavy volley of musketry and cannon. The troops then stormed the intrenchments. The rebel loss is estimated at over 300 killed, and the Spanish loss at nearly 200 killed and wounded, principally wounded. General PUELLO remained on the battle field several days.

General Puello at Guaimaro—Capture of a Supposed Filibuster—An Editorial Duel Forthcoming.

HAVANA, Jan. 28.—Official accounts state that while General PUELLO remained near Guaimaro, he made daily excursions in the surrounding country, but met no parties of insurgents. He finally withdrew to Arryro Hondo, where he waited fifteen days, until he could collect sufficient transportation to enable him to undertake his return march. During the latter part of the campaign his troops were obliged to live on unsalted meat.
