Capture of Two Schooners by a British Causer—The Spanish Troops Arrived on the Island.

HAVANA, Jan. 7.—The following intelligence has been received from Nassau: The schooner Violin left Nassau on the 17th of December, having cleared for Puerto Plata with a cargo of arms and ammunition. On the 18th the schooner Tweed sailed for Jacksonville, having on board sixty Cubans. On the 19th, while at sea, the Tweed transferred the Cubans to the Violin. The British gunboat Lagwing was watching the transfer, and after it was accomplished took both schooners in tow and brought them back to Nassau.

Washington, Jan. 7.—The United States Consul-General at Havana sends a slip cut from a newspaper in that city, to the Navy Department, relating to the arrival of the Spanish frigate Navas de Toloto. The number of troops brought by her, added to those already on the island, make the total 13,584.
