## Another Cuban Filibustering Enterprise —Seizure of the Steamer *Hornet*.

The side-wheel steamer *Hornet*, formerly the *Cuba*, was seized at the foot of Twelfth-street, East River, near the Novelty Iron Works, on Thursday evening, by Deputy Marshals CROWLEY and ROBINSON, on process issued by Col. BETTS, Clerk of the District Court. A libel was filed against the vessel by District-Attorney DAVIS, who represented that he had been informed that she was being fitted out to carry munitions of war, including ordnance and small arms, to Cuba, to be used by the insurgents in the revolution against Spain. The informer is believed to be a private detective named DAVIS, otherwise known as the "Spanish spy." It is alleged that the *Hornet* was recently furnished with new machinery, and that it was the intention of her officers to take her to sea today, on a Cuban filibustering expedition, under the pretence that she was going on a trial trip. She was to be joined in the vicinity of Sandy Hook by two schooners, from which she was to receive her cargo. It is also said that the vessel is owned by a wealthy Cuban resident, belonging to the Junta in this City. This statement is denied by Mr. BROWN, the agent of the vessel, who says he will show that the *Hornet* was not designated to be used in violation of the Neutrality laws, before Judge BLATCHFORD, at the District Court, on the 25th inst., the time when the process is made returnable.

About fifteen Cubans were found on the *Hornet* on Thursday night. The *Hornet* was seized at Wilmington, N. C., several months ago, on a similar charge.
