THE WEST INDIES.

Readers of the Cuban Rebelion Condemued to Death-Status of the West India and Panama Cable-News from Mexico and Venezuela.

HAVANA, Nov. 14.—The Court-martial in session here has condemned to death all the leaders of the rebellion, the members of the various Cuban Juntas, and all other persons who have been instrumental in the rebellion, but who are now absent from Cuba. The estates of all such will be confiscated.

Kingston, Jamaica. advices of the 9th, report the return of the Panama and West India Company's steamer Dacia, short of coal and provisions, and with Chagres fever among the crew, four deaths having taken place. Her efforts to recover the lost cable proved unsuccessful, the weather being unfavorable. The laying of the cable to Aspinwall had been abandoned for the present. Sir Charles Bright intended to lay the cable to St. Thomas and Porto Rico, and afterward grapple for the Aspinwall line.... Gen A. Varona has been killed.

Advices from the City of Mexico to the 10th have been received. The report of a personal difficulty between Romero and Lerdo de Tejada, during which the latter struck the Minister of Finance in the face, is pronounced on the best authority a pure invention.

Caracas dates to the 2d inst. are at hand. The steamer Virgin and schooner Billy Butts were in Venezuela waters, closely watched by a Spanish man-of-war, it being suspected that they had arms on board for the Cuban insurgents.
