

## SEÑOR ROBERTS' WEDDING.

### Marriage of the Spanish Minister to a Cuban Lady at St. Stephen's Church—The Ceremony and the Guests—Words of Good Will.

Last evening was celebrated at the Catholic Church of St. Stephen, Twenty-eighth-street and Lexington-avenue, the marriage of Señor MAURITIO LOPEZ ROBERTS, the Spanish Minister, to a young Cuban lady, Miss ANGELA TERRE, who has been residing for some years with her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. E. PONVERT, at No. 15 West Thirty-first-street, and was a regular member of the church in which she made her nuptial vows. The event excited great interest in fashionable circles, and the galleries and aisles were crowded with ladies and gentlemen.

The high altar was tastefully decorated with red and white roses intertwined, and the white marble glowed in the light of numerous tapers and gas jets, which threw a flood of splendor upon the gigantic painting of the Transfiguration; and at the altar of Our Lady, a circle of lights and rows of waxen tapers surrounded the grand painting of the Assumption, before which hundreds of ladies, before and after the ceremony, knelt in worship of a daughter of Eve crowned as Queen of Heaven. As the wedding party began to arrive the organist, Mr. DANNEFORTH, filled the church with joyous strains, alternating with the old familiar "Home, Sweet Home" and "Fondly Old Memories," and the bride and bridegroom and their immediate friends were ushered up the aisle and under the altar rails to the music of a triumphal march. The lovely bride who arrived leaning on the arm of her uncle, Mr. PONVERT, was clothed in white, with a magnificent lace veil. The formality of bridesmaids was dispensed with, but the respective ladies of most of the representatives of foreign Powers at Washington were present.

The pastor of the church, Very Rev. E. MCGLYNN, officiated, assisted by Rev. E. F. X. MCSWEENEY. The bride and bridegroom, with their friends, having taken their places before the high altar, Rev. Dr. MCGLYNN addressed a short but beautiful exhortation to those whom he was about to unite in wedlock, explaining the dignity of the sacrament, and how sacred it was, as symbolizing the union of Christ and His Church. He, as Christ's unworthy minister, invoked upon them God's choicest blessings, and wished them a long and happy life, a type of lasting joy hereafter with the saints. He impressed upon them that it was necessary not only to love and cherish each other, but to bear with each other. He said it was a beautiful thought that the young bride should be sought in marriage at that altar where she so often came to experience the blessings of religion, by a representative of the grand old Catholic race from which she springs, and he hoped the plighting of his troth at that altar, by one who represents Spain, to a lady who, though of the same race, belonged to Cuba, would be typical of future good will and friendship between those two peoples. With these few words prior to the ceremony that would make them man and wife, he would conclude by wishing them long life, happiness and prosperity here, and hereafter joy with the saints above. The ceremony was then proceeded with, and the words were spoken that united the happy pair forever.

WEBSTER, of Washington, the latter a daughter of Secretary FISH. The ushers were Señors HENRIQUE NAYAS, PEDRO DIAZ DE RIVERA, Secretaries of Legation; Señors TOMAS DE PULGAR and FRANCELLEA, attachés, and LOUIS PONVERT, cousin to the bride.
