

The counsel for the accused appeared at the United States District-Attorney's office yesterday, and said that his client had promised to attend the Court this morning, in company with his sureties. The bench-warrant for the arrest of RUIZ was issued two or three days ago, but the Deputy Marshal who was assigned to take him was unable to ascertain his whereabouts. The accused read of his contemplated arrest in the TIMES, and then took measures with a view of surrendering himself. Señor RUIZ, who is at present a guest at the Clarendon Hotel, visited this country some time ago in a sort of ambassadorial capacity in behalf of his fellow patriots in Cuba. The particular charge under which he and Gen. JORDAN are to be prosecuted is for "setting on foot a military expedition and enlisting men to serve as soldiers in Cuba." The allegation that Gen. JORDAN and Señor RUIZ were engaged together in a filibustering conspiracy is denied by friends of the former, who say that the two gentlemen were inimical to each other, and did not act in concert in their labors in behalf of the Cuban cause. It is said that the disclosure of the evidence in the case will develop the fact that a bitter quarrel exists among the Cuban leaders in this City, and that several of them were engaged in collecting money for their own use, under the pretense of using it for the Cuban cause. It is reported that a number of wealthy Cuban ladies in this City sold their jewelry in order to provide money to carry on the war against Spain, and that the proceeds fell into the hands of adventurers, who converted it to their own use.

Señor Ruiz, the Cuban Ambassador, to Surrender Himself Today—His Feeling Between Him and Gen. Jordan—Quarrel Among the Cuban Leaders.

Señor DOMINGO RUIZ, jointly accused with Gen. THOMAS JORDAN of violating the Neutrality laws, will surrender himself at the United States Circuit Court, before Judge WOODRUFF, today, for the purpose furnishing bail to appear at the February term of the Court to answer the indictments which have been found against him.
