The sacrifice of the several victims, no matter how guilty they may have been, has to a certain extent obliterated the effect produced, at least in the eyes of foreigners. AFTER SCENES. The Diario, which, as I stated above, has lost caste owing to its utter want of truthfulness, reforring to the report propagated in New-York that three hundred Cubans had been killed, as an act of vengeance, on account of the Castanon murder, says that not the slightest disorder took place either whilst the body was brought the to office of the Voz de Cuba. that the victim was buried anybody attempting even the slightest act of retaliation. The Prensa, more truthful, says. two men were killed because they had made some insulting and ill-timed remarks about Cas-TANON's death. If the reputation of the Prensa alone were not sufficient to vouch for the veracity of its assertion, in strong opposition to that of the Diario, the following account of an eyewitness, a Spaniard, would corroborate the facts: A number of persons were drinking at a grocery store in Gervasio-street, among them a Mr. VICENTE DAUMY, well known in New-York and New-Orleans as a horse dealer. He remarked in presence of several volunteers, " E was in Key West when Castanon was killed, and

he merited his fate;" whereupon one of the volunteers answered: "Did he In that case you shall share the same." One of the volunteers then got a rifle, when DAUMY attempted to get away, but was held firmly and carried into the street. The gun was then placed against his head and fired, but it only wounded him slightly, although he fell and pretended to be dead. The ruse was detected and the gun again loaded; feeling the muzzle against his temple Daumy ejaculated only the word, "Por," undoubtedly intending to say Por Dios, when the bullet sent his spirit into eternity. DAUMAY has long been suspected, and was considered a very active and keen emissary of the insurgents. Another victim was had in the person of Mr. LUNA, also accused of having made some similar remarks. Besides, two Chinese and a mulatto were killed. A gentleman by the name of Podestad was also killed last night, but 'particulars are as yet unknown. A Court Martial is trying several persons, among them Mr. Sinven, the cashler of DEMESTRE & Co., all accused of some connection with the insurrection. As this retail killing business has now been inaugurated, and every man with a musket has to a certain extent constituted himself accuser, judge, jury and executioneor, the civil tribunals or trials by Court Martial being set at naught, and the nuthority of the laws, unrecognized.
