The Cuban Revolution—Arrival of the Remains of the Late Mr. Green-waldth.

Yesterday morning, at 10 o'clock, the steamship Bienville arrived at Pier No. 36 North River, from Havana, having on board the remains of Mr. Greenwaldth. Mr. Greenwaldth was one of the three Americans recently shot by the Spanish Volunteers. It was expected that the removal of the remains of Mr. GREENWALDTH from the steamer Bienville would be made the occasion of a public demonstration. This was not so. The remains were consigned to Mr. KEMP, of the firm of LANMAN & KEMP, druggists, Old-slip and Water-street, and were removed by him as quietly as possible. It was the desire of the family and friends of the deceased that the ceremony should be performed with respectful reverence and privacy. Mr. Kemp carried out their wishes in that respect. The deceased served the firm of Lanman & Kemp faithfully and well for thirteen years. He was a married man, and left a wife and seven young children to mourn his loss. At present the remains are consigned to an undertaker in the Bowery. Tomorrow they will be removed to the Jewish Cemetery at Williamsburg for interment.
