CUBA.

General Quesnda in Florida—An Important Mission from Cespedes—Reported Spanish Reverses—Plantations Burned Sr. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Feb. 25.—General QUESADA, Commander-in-Chief of the Cuban army, and staff, arrived here yesterday from Cuba, via Nassau, on an important mission from President CESPEDES, leaving General JORDAN in command. He left Cuba the 27th ult., receiving the most enthusiastic demonstrations of confidence from his countrymen. PUELLO and GOY-ENECHE had been defeated in Camaguey. The Spaniards had been discomfited at all points.

HAVANA, Feb. 25.—A fire broke out yesterday on the Carman plantation, near Cardenas. A high wind carried the flames to four adjoining estates, and fourteen fields were destroyed, with all the buildings upon them. Owing to the measures of safety now taken everywhere in the country, the flames were mastered in four hours.

Cuban Surrenders Reported—A Fillibuster Party Landed—A Steamer on the Reefs.

HAVANA. Feb. 25.—The insurgent Colonel GARCIA with five officers and eighty soldiers surrendered voluntarily to-day at Villa Clara and took the oath of alleguance to Spain. A report is current that another party of fillibusters with arms and ammunition effected a landing near Jibara, and are now in the Holquin jurisdiction. VALMASEDA in person has gone in pursuit of the filibusters. The Spanish gunboat Guardian is ashore on the reefs near Bayari. Assistance has been sent to her.

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
