Kings County Republican General Committee—Sympathy for Cuba.

The Kings County Republican General Committee met in Brooklyn last evening, GEORGE C. BENNETT presiding.

The Committee on Contested Seats reported in favor of the delegations headed as follows: First Ward, E. A. STUDWELL; Sixth Ward, E. D. WEBSTER, and the Twenty-first Ward, J. ALLEN.

In the case of the Twelfth Ward, the Committee reported in favor of WM. H. BURLEIGH and CHAUNCEY M. FELT being a Committee to make a new enrollment, and to hold a new election for ward officers and delegates to the General Committee on Wednesday evening, Feb. 23.

J. B. WILLEY offered the following:

Resolved, That the people of Cuba in their efforts to establish a Republican form of government, have our deepest sympathy, and should call forth the most earnest efforts in their behalf; and

Whereas, The time now spent in the councils of the nation in discussing vague generalities of international law, suggest to us the propriety of intimating to our Representatives and Senators in Congress that the sentiments of this body, at least, are in sympathy with those who are struggling to maintain institutions in accordance with our own; and

Whereas, A *de facto* Government has been maintained for over one year, the cause of liberty and free institutions demand from the Government of the United States the immediate recognition of the Republic of Cuba, by granting to them belligerent rights.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing be forwarded to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.

Colonel E. B. LANSING spoke in support of the resolution and urged their adoption by a unanimous vote.

Messrs. GEO. C. BENNETT, E. A. WEBSTER and other gentlemen were opposed to the resolution.
