The Ladies of Puerto Principe Appeal to their Relatives to Abandon the Cuban Cause—The Spanish Policy.

HAVANA, May 9.—Some of the principal ladies in Puerto Principe have signed their names to an address calling on their relatives in the insurgent ranks to return and enjoy liberty under the Spanish Government.

Washington, May 9.—The Government has not recently received any Official information concerning the events in Cuba, nor is there anything to induce a belief of a change of policy on the part of Spain.

Additional Executions—An Abandoned Rebel Craft Destroyed.

Havana, May 9.—Official dispatches from Puerto Principe represent that the insurgent army has disappeared from the Camaguey district. Gen. Varona, chief of staff of the rebel Gonzales Agramonte, and Pay-master Morales have been captured and executed. A party of sixteen armed insurgents came to Puerto Principe and surrendered.... The gun-boats at Guajaba Key have discovered and destroyed another rebel craft. No one was on board....The United States steamer Tuscarora has arrived here to convoy the Dictator to Key West.

A British Opinion of the Struggle—Intervention Inopportune.

London, May 9.—In the House of Commons, Mr. Otway, Under Foreign Secretary, in reply to a question of Mr.Gilpin, said the Spanish Government was fully able to subdue the insurrection in Cuba. The insurgents held no important place. The interference of Her Majesty's Government, which had been suggested, would be inopportune. He promised that the Government would not fail to seize any occasion to mitigate the horrors of civil war in that island, and it would be highly desirable to have the co-operation of the Government of the United States.
