and satisfied that the actual state of affairs in Cuba need only be made clearly known in this City to insure immediate and complete relief, he calls upon the New-York ladies to take the matter in hand, and provide clothing for the sufferers.

Gen. Jordan has issued an appeal to the ladies of New-York, in which he says that the women and children of Cuba are almost desti-

women and children of Cuba are almost destitute of clothing. This extreme destitution, he says, has come upon them because their families, for the most part, had to leave, suddenly, their homes in the towns and cities, with little means of transportation. The few articles of clothing they were able to carry in their flight, having been worn out, after eighteen months of war, they have been unable to get others; for, meanwhile, all commercial intercourse or trade with the exterior world has been utterly cut off.
