The North Atlantic Squadron—The Spanish Authorities Beginning to Feel Respect for Americans.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—Complaints having been frequently made that the naval force in the North Atlantic is inadequate, it is proper to state as the result of inquiry that one-third of the vessels afloat are in that squadron—or thirteen vessels, including three iron-clads. Rear-Admiral LEE will soon proceed thither to supersede Rear-Admiral POOR, with minute and positive instructions to fully protect all American citizens in all their rights.

No official accounts have recently been received concerning affairs in Cuba, but private letters represent that the authorities there are much interested in preventing difficulties between the people and American citizens there.

Asiatic Cholera and Small-Pox in Havana.

HAVANA, June 23.—A number of cases of Asiatic cholera have occurred here within a few days, a large percentage resulting fatally. The Civil Governor, Señor ROBERTS, is taking the necessary precautions to prevent the spread of the disease. The small-pox is unabated. Several deaths have also occurred on board the gun-boats cruising off Sagua. In the interior, cholera of a violent type is prevailing in many places. As yet there have been but few cases of vomito.
