The Slavery Question—Movement Toward Abolition—An Election for Deputies to the Cortes—Camaguay—Portillo Superseded.

HAVANA, July 12.—A meeting of the prominent slave-owners of the western section of Cuba was held at the Captain-General's palace, yesterday. Captain-General DE RODAS was chosen President. After a discussion of the subject of the abolition of slavery in Cuba, a Committee, composed of twenty-five of those present, was appointed to consider the matter, and report, at the earliest date possible, the most feasible and liberal plan for the abolition of slavery throughout the Island, said Committee to initiate the movement by immediately carrying out the provisions of the plan adopted. After the completion of the plan, it will be presented to the Spanish Cortes for approval. The meeting was very harmonious, all being unanimous in the belief that slavery must be abolished, and all accepting the measure as patriotic, and in accordance with the spirit of the country. Captain-General DE RODAS, acting in concert with the Government of Spain, has ordered an election for Deputies to represent the Island of Cuba in the Spanish Cortes. It is expected that the election will take place before the end of August. Those Cubans of the District of Camaguay, who were recently in rebellion against the Spanish authorities, and have returned to their allegiance, are now working on their plantations. Arms have been given them by the Government, and they are now organizing for self-protection against the insurgents, for any roving bands that may appear in that section. Gen. GOYENECHÉ has relieved Gen. PORTILLO of the command of the Cinco-Villas district.
