CUBA.

Important News—Reported Victories for the Insurgents—The Planters Strongly Opposed to Emancipation.

HAVANA, July 6, via KEY WEST, July 7.—Captain-General DE RODAS will probably go to Santiago de Cuba. Gen. VALMASEDA has left Bayamo to go there also. The troops in the vicinity of Santiago de Cuba are acting altogether on the defensive. Col. BALMES, who is in command at Santiago de Cuba, had made demands for reinforcements, but was unable to get any. Various reports represent positively that the Spanish troops have been defeated in several engagements recently with the insurgent leaders, DIAZ and GOMEZ. The situation of the Spaniards in the Eastern Department is unfavorable.

The planters are holding meetings, and nearly all of them refuse to obey the emancipation laws, and will resist the freeing of the slaves. Large amounts of money have been raised to send to Spain in order to avoid the execution of the law and to secure its repeal.
