A Letter From Mr. Azcarate—He Is Not an Agent of the Spanish Government.

To the Agent of the New-York Associated Press:

DEAR SIR: Several of the papers of this City having variously stated that I am accredited by the Government of Spain to treat in its behalf with the directors of the Cuban revolution, I think it is proper to rectify the error incurred, by declaring that I do not represent the Government, nor do I bear official character of any kind. While, as a Cuban, I deplore that a misunderstanding between many of my countrymen and modern Spain should keep up in Cuba a cruel and ruinous war; while I uphold the national unity as the most sure way of realizing the abolitionist and radical ideas which I profess; and while I believe, too, the Government thinks itself, with good reason, strong enough to conquer, I am not the bearer of any mission whatever, nor do I propose to meddle in the question. I therefore beg of you, in behalf of the truth, that you will publish these lines. And believe me, your obedient servant,
