

# CUBA.

**Spanish Sensations—The Insurgents Ordered to Lay Down Their Arms by the Junta in New York—The Failure of Negotiations in the United States the Cause—Arrival of One of the New Gunboats at Havana.**

HAVANA, Jan. 1, 1870.

Intense excitement prevails here in consequence of the announcement in the Havana journals of this evening that the revolution has terminated. According to the published statements the editors of the journals have seen a copy of a circular signed by the members of the Cuban Junta in New York ordering the insurgents to lay down their arms for the present, and giving as reasons for the abandonment of the insurrection the failure of recent filibustering expeditions and the inability of the Junta to send more men; and further, the disheartening action of the American government in permitting the gunboats to sail from New York. The circular severely attacks the course of President Grant. The Junta advises the Cubans to submit to the Spaniards in order to save further bloodshed,

The *Voz de Cuba* (sensationalist) announces the surrender of 1,500 insurgents at Tunas to General Benegas. The *Diario* announces that the ex-rebel General Coca offers to raise a body of guerillas to fight against the insurgents.

One Spanish gunboat arrived to-day, having become separated from its companions off the heights of Charleston. The rest are expected to arrive to-morrow.

A fire to-night destroyed five houses on Monte street.

Further announcements are made from the interior of bodies of insurgents offering to capitulate. If all the news is true the revolution may be considered as expiring; but a full confirmation of it is wanting.

The steamer *Cleopatra* sailed this morning for Vera Cruz.
