The Winter Campaign of the Spaniards Ended—Nothing Accomplished—They Fall Back to the Towns—Quesada and Varona Appointed to an Important Mission.

José Morales Lemus and Miguel Aldama have received the following telegram:—

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 25, 1870.

The Spanish winter campaign came to a disastrous end at Najasa, Cuba, on the 23th of January. The Spaniards retreated to the towns. Delegations from the unarmed classes of the Cuban army beg for arms to attack the towns.

Céspedes has appointed General Quesada and Colonel Adolfo Varona to an important foreign mission. They sailed from Cuba in the midst of the enemy's cruisers. They arrived at Nassau. They are now at Jacksonville, Florida. They will be in New York from the 26th to the 1st.
