Contenance of the Carnival—De Rodas' Latest Proclamation—Suicide—More Arrests and More Courts Martial—The Masonic Order Denounced.

HAVANA, March 7, 1870.

The second carnival celebration took place yesterday. The concourse of people and carriages was unprecedented. It is estimated that fully 50,000 people were in the procession. Contrary to former years, not the slightest disturbance occurred to mar the pleasure of the day.

Captain General De Rodas has issued a proclamation in relation to the murder of Isaac Greenwalt and the execution of Zamora. He says that at the time of the assassination Greenwalt was under the protection of the Spanish flag; that the assassin outraged the law and disgraced his flag and has been justly executed for the crime. Although Zamora was a member of the volunteer force the honor of the corps to which he belonged is again bright because vindicated by the example of his punishment.

Andres Yurubé, a brother-in-law of the American Consul at Trinidad, who had been arrested and confined in jail on the charge of sedition, hung himself to-day.

Eighteen laborantes have been court martialed in Bayamo, documents having been found upon the person of Marciano implicating them in the movements of the insurgents.

The *Fox de Cuba* publishes an article to-day denunciatory of Masonry in Cuba. The Masons lately arrested for holding a meeting contrary to the order of the Captain General are still in jail.
