Spanish Accounts—The Insurgents in the Camaguey District—Changes in the Cuban Army—Rumors About Cespedes—Another Order from the Captain General.

HAVANA, May 2, 1870.

The following reports of the situation in the interior come from Spanish sources:—

The insurgents in the Camaguey district continue to present themselves in large numbers to receive pardon.

The resignation of the rebel General Agramonte is confirmed.

The rebels have abolished the rank of General in Chief, and appointed Frederic Cavada chief of operators and Bambita commanding general in the Cinco Villas district.

Fifteen Spanish soldiers captured last June by the rebels have just arrived at Puerto Principe. They were threatened with death by Quesada, but their lives were saved through the intercession of Bambita, with whom they served up to the time of their release.

The rebel President Cespedes is roaming about the coast, never sleeping twice in the same place.

The disloyal Prefect Betancourt, alias Barbazo, and the Sub-Prefect Rafeti, have been captured and executed at Puerto Principe.

The gunboat Saldado recently captured a small boat at La Guajata Key. In the boat were found a passport issued to General Golcouria and a commission as Ambassador to Mexico, both signed by Cespedes. Other gunboats coming up the Key were surrounded. A search will be made, and if Golcouria is on the island he cannot escape.

Many insurgents have been killed at Alvarez and near Santo Espirita, by the volunteers.

Captain General De Rodas has issued an order requiring all persons residing within the Insurrectionary district to come to the nearest settlement or town,

within the next thirty days, and threatening that should they neglect to do so, if captured, they will be treated as rebels.

This order causes much excitement, and is considered a heavy blow to the insurgent cause,
