

Progress of the Insurrection—Sickness.

TRINIDAD DE CUBA, July 19, 1870.

The insurrection drags as ever, with no prospect of coming to a termination. The troops scattered about among the hills, enervated by the climate, more hostile to them than the Cuban partisans, lack the energy to pursue the insurgents, while the latter seem to be in no better condition, for they fail to harass, as usual, their enemies. Sickness is prevalent throughout the country. Vomito, cholera and smallpox claim their own in some of the small towns adjoining at the rate of thirty to fifty daily. Three North German barks are discharging at the port of Caguay.
