Recent Engagements with Insurgents— Four Thousand Cubans Surrendered— The Casanova Case.

HAVANA, March 3.—The official account of the engagement near Mayari states that one Captain and fourteen soldiers are missing. In the engagements near Bayamo, OCLASCO and MODESTO DIAZ, and thirteen insurgents, were killed. In the affair near Tunas fifty-three insurgents were killed, and the insurgent Captain, CLEMENTE GARCIS, was also killed. Near Trinidad, the insurgent CARLOS CERECENO was captured. A Spanish column also captured Major LEOPOLD VILLEGAS, a son of Gen. VILLEGAS, and killed seven insurgents. The insurgent leader, CHICHO VALTADARES, surrendered, together with ten armed men, at Platopolo. During the past fortnight, in the Central Department, fifty-two insurgents were killed, and over 4,000 persons gave in their adhesion to the Spanish Government.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 3.—The telegram in today's papers, dated New-York, relative to the expulsion of INOCENCIO CASANOVA, from Havana, excites much comment, but recalls the facts that in the Spring of 1869, Consul HALL wrote to the Department of State that CASANOVA was connected with the filibustering expedition of the *Commanditario*. He was released on the 23d of April, and the Consul secured for him a passport to leave the Island of Cuba. CASANOVA some weeks ago procured a passport from this Government and returned to Cuba under the pretext of attending to business affairs, but it is alleged with different intentions, which were made known to the Department of State. The subject of his recent expulsion from Havana will, however, be investigated.
