Surrender of Marmol—Probabilities of his Execution.

HAVANA, June 18.—The insurgent Gen. EDUARDO MARMOL, who at the beginning of the revolution raised a band of four hundred negroes in the jurisdiction of Guantanamo, offered to surrender to Gen. PALANCA, at Santiago de Cuba. Gen. PALANCA refused to accept his surrender unless MARMOL brought a certain number of insurgents with him, which the Spanish Government demands as a condition for the pardon of an officer of his rank. MARMOL thereupon went to Ciego de Avila, accompanied by a friend, and surrendered to the Spanish commander. As he came without the prescribed number of men, he will probably be shot.
