Capture and Execution of the Cuban Poet Zenea.

HAVANA, Jan. 12, 1871.

Among the fifteen fugitives recently captured near Guanaja was Don Juan Clemente Zenea, the son-in-law of President Juarez, of Mexico, and distinguished as a Cuban poet. He has since been tried and executed for being a bearer of rebel despatches.

The reports published in American journals announcing that Valmaseda has caused many Cubans in Havana and other places to be imprisoned, are pure inventions. No arrests of Cubans have been made, and the city is safe and tranquil. The only arrests made were of vagabond negroes known as dangerous characters. Another negro suspected of complicity in the assassination of Oberbaur, the German, has been arrested, and attempts are being made by the citizens to obtain the banishment of this dangerous class of the population.

The wife of President Cespedes sailed this afternoon for New York city.

The death of the wife of President Juarez, of Mexico, is much regretted here by the Mexicans.
