

**THE GUERRILLA WAR IN CUBA.**—By special telegram from the HERALD's correspondent in Havana we hear of further successes by the Cuban rebels. A guerilla party, under an active leader, has surprised a Spanish column and put forty of its number *hors de combat*. The guerillas then vanished. Four Spanish columns attempted to surprise the rebels in their mountain strongholds and met with a severe repulse. Their loss was so heavy that Captain General Valmaseda had gone to inquire into the case. The war has now assumed the complexion of mere bushwhacking, and we must be prepared to hear of a number of such affairs as are mentioned above before the end comes. The rebels are confined to mountain strongholds—positions that it is

madness to attack—and, watching their opportunity, they swoop down upon small bodies of men and cut them off. Such is the war now being carried on.
