Death of an American Insurgent Colonel—Valmaseda's Measures to Stamp Out the Insurrection—Rewards Upon the Heads of the Leaders—Surrender of Insurgent Generals.

TELEGRAM TO THE NEW YORK HERALD.

HAVANA, JUNE 27, 1871.

Charles Westrop, an American insurgent colonel, has been killed.

Captain General Valmaseda, in a proclamation, offers to pardon the Spanish deserters and grant them better terms of service if they deliver up their present chiefs, dead or alive.

He gives large rewards to those conducting the loyal troops to places where they can surprise the insurgent camps, and also to those contributing to the capture of the principal leaders of the insurrection.

The execution of Marmol is confirmed.

AN IMPORTANT SURRENDER.

The insurgent Generals Fernando Espinosa and José Mendoza—the latter general of the celebrated "Cannao" cavalry—surrendered to-day, with sixty-two armed Cubans and ninety other persons, at Las Puntas.
