

# MANY OF THE REBELS KILLED.

## Two Revolutionary Bands in Cuba Defeated.

**Their Camp at Santa Rosa Captured—Rabi's Forces at Magote Routed—Arms and Ammunition Taken—Spanish Lieut.-Gen. Salcedo Has Not Been Recalled as Reported.**

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 19, 1895. Gen. Navarro reports that the troops under his command have had an engagement with a rebel band, under Garzon at Santa Rosa, and captured their camp, together with a quantity of arms, etc.

Many of the rebels were killed. The government loss was three seriously wounded.

Col. Michelena's column has routed Rabi's band at Mogote. Four prisoners and a quantity of arms were captured by the Spaniards. The government force lost one killed and one wounded.

Jose Marti's wife has asked permission to remove her husband's body to Havana, and Gen. Campos has agreed to allow it after the lapse of five years.

The report cabled from Madrid to a Havana newspaper announcing the probable recall of Lieut.-Gen. Salcedo is denied in Santiago semi-official circles as being without foundation.

Gen. Salcedo himself, in an interview, says he has no intention of resigning and no desire to return to Spain until the war in Cuba is at an end. He thinks that the story was circulated by personal enemies of himself and Gen. Campos, or that it is attributable to some base political conspiracy.

Gen. Lachambre, who, on account of illness, recently obtained leave to return to Spain, has partially recovered his strength, and has, therefore, decided to forego the trip. He is still at the head of his division, directing the government military operations in the vicinity of Manzanillo and Bayamo.

Gen. Meila is already on his way here from Cadiz, in the expectation of succeeding Lachambre. He will probably be sent to Puerto Principe instead and put in command of the division there.

Capt. Monteverde, adjutant to Gen. Lachambre, arrived in Santiago from Manzanillo yesterday bringing with him important official dispatches for Gen. Garrich, the civil and military governor of the province. Monteverde says that the new railway to Bayamo is being actively pushed forward. He thinks that Gen. Masso accompanied Gomez on his march to Puerto Principe, as Amador Guerra, is now apparently in chief command of revolutionary operations in the valley of Yara.

The report that Reitor and Vega are wounded is unconfirmed.

The Cubans in Kingston, Jamaica, are momentarily expecting the arrival of Estrada Palma and they are preparing an expedition to take him to the coast of Calaguey.
