

## MARTI'S DEATH ADMITTED.

Ambushed and Slain—A Patriot from  
Boyhood—His Noted Career,  
New York World.

Senor Lorenzo Pulg, a leading Cuban in this city, said yesterday to a World reporter:

"Unfortunately I find now, despite the contradictory stories told, that Jose Marti is in fact dead. I have received the news from Nassau. He was not killed in the battle of Bocadados Rio, as has been supposed.

Jose ti was born in Havana in Febru 1853, and was graduated from the Nl School there. In 1869 he made i of a parade in Calle de Amistnd was arrested. The authorities n on him some revolutionary verses had written and sent him to a tentiary. When released he went Spain, completing the course of thniversity of Saragossa. In Spain published a pamphlet on his prison.

Whne Republicans in Spain were fightipr a republic, Marti argued in a partecting for seven hours against the psition in which the Cubans were ed to be contented with the Federtepublica of Spain without being apublic by themselves.

In 1 Marti went to Mexico to write for tUniversal Review. There he marr Miss Carmen Layas Bazan and ve sevral plays, which met with greatcess.

Four years afterward he went to Guatla and wrote, at the governmentequest, a historical drama in versehen he returned to Havana and pliced law.

In just, 1879, another revolutionary movent was set on foot, and Marti was led. He went to France and fromere he came to New York, devotin himself to the preparation of the pent movement for independence.

Hended in Sabana-la-Mar on the 14th last April with Gen. Maximo Gom
