

DEATH OF THADDEUS STEVENS.—Thaddeus Stevons, died at midnight last night, at his residence on Capitol Hill, Washington. His nephews, his housekeeper, Mr. J. Scott Patterson, of the Interior Department; Sisters Loretta and Genevieve, of Providence Hospital; and the servants of his household, were at his bedside. It is stated that he passed away calmly and quietly. Mr. Stevons has occupied recently a large share of public attention, as the late leader of the Radical party in Congress. He has been long in public life. He was a native of Vermont, but settled in Pennsylvania in 1816—and was upwards of 75 years of age at the time of his death.

His public career was always marked with great bitterness of spirit, and was well calculated to exasperate those against whom he acted, and, frequently, not even to conciliate his own political friends. His teachings, in our opinion, were never designed for the real good of the country, and his course actuated by an apparently vindictive disposition, which excused, if it did not justify, the feelings entertained towards him by thousands at the North, and in the whole Southern country.
