DR. GRAU STRESSES POST-WAR SECURITY

Cuba's President-Elect Urges Use of New U. S. Bases to Guard Americas

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2 (P)--Dr. Ramon Grau San Martin, President-elect of Cuba, declared today at a press conference that his country should continue col-laborating with the Matter of the his country should continue col-laborating with the United States after the war for the defense of

the Americas. He pointed out that the Cuban bases now being used by the Unit-ed States for the defense of the Caribbean and the Panama Canal Cuban will return to complete possession of his country six months after the war. Bit, he added, Cuba should continue to extend collaboration to the United States with these bases under Cuban control

the United States with these bases under Cuban control. Dr. Grau San Martin made these statements at a formal press con-ference in the Blair Lee House, of-ficial Government guest house, be-fore forty-seven Washington cor-reservendents. respondents.

Defense of Americas Stressed

Cuba's president-elect discussed numerous subjects with corre-spondents, ranging from interna-tional issues to purely local topics concerning his program for admin-istering affairs on the Island Re-public in the four years beginning Oct. 10 discussed 10. Öct.

Uct. 10. He dwelt at length on the sub-ject of extending the use of Cuba's military and naval bases for the future protection of the Americas in the post-war era. He spoke of them not as single units but as an integral part of a vast system that would honeycomb the Americas

them not as single units but as an integral part of a vast system that would honeycomb the Americas with impregnable defenses against any future would-be invader. "I believe," he said, "in integra-ting the bases in Cuba in a general American system. All of the coun-tries of America must establish de-fenses for the solidarity of the hemisphere." hemisphere."

The new Cuban leader, whose entire press conference was broad-cast, demonstrated a clear per-spective regarding the island's problems as he spoke in detail of the program he intends to put into effect after his inauguration. The main objectives of his ad-ministration he said are:

The main objectives of his ad-ministration, he said, are: 1. To raise the standard of liv-ing of the Cuban people, especially the peasants who have no roads, schools, or communications with

ing of the Cuba... the peasants who have schools, or communications whun the outside world. 2. To increase agricultural pro-duction, develop irrigation and es-tablish some kind of river control which will benefit the health of the people and tend to increase agricultural production. The most pressing need of Cuba, Dr. Grau said, is machinery to in-tensify production, in order to take care of agriculture, public services and road construction. He empha-sized time and again the urgency of building new roads. A formal dinner and reception given by Ambassador Aurelio F. Concheso at the Cuban Embassy tonight ended the official visit to the capital of Dr. Grau San Martin. Tuba's President elect and his

party are scheduled to leave Wash-ington tomorrow for New York, where they will stay several days before returning to Havana.
