

# PRIO EXPULSION HALTED

## Judge in Miami Gives U. S. 5 Days to Make Charges

MIAMI, Fla., May 22 (AP)—A Federal judge stopped the United States Department of Justice today from expelling Carlos Prio Socarras, a former President of Cuba, from this country immediately. Judge Emmett Choate, in granting Señor Prio a writ of habeas Corpus, gave the Department of Justice five days in which to make charges against Señor Prio in support of its exclusion order.

Judge Choate said: "Every man is entitled to know what he is accused of. The charges must be specific. The evidence on which charges are based may be secret, but certainly the charges are not secret."

Señor Prio and his aide, Rafael Izquierdo, arrived here by plane May 9 and reported they were expelled from Cuba by the National Police. They were notified Monday by the Department of Justice that their presence in this country was prejudicial to the public interest.

Señor Prio has acknowledged he was active in a previous exile in efforts to overthrow the regime of President Fulgencio Batista, who deposed him in 1952.
