Francisco Tabernilla, chief of the army, had been dismissed. (The United Press said heavy firing was continuing at 3:40 p.m., and was being returned from inside the palace. The firing seemed to be from submachineguns and possibly small mortars.)

the radio. The station went off the air while he was in the middle of a sentence. Students have been in the forefront of the opposition to President Fulgencio Batista since he came to power in a

military coup March 10, 1952.

Fidel Castro, a former student

leader, has been actively fighting army units in recent weeks
from his hideout in the mountains of southeastern Cuba.
The government recently said
Castro's forces had dwindled
to about 20 men and represent-

ed no threat to the Batista

regime.

For many months elements opposed to Batista have terrorized various cities by almost nightly bombings. Usually the bombs caused little or no damage and apparently have been
