

Documents Taken In Ship Blast, Cuban Exiles Say

MIAMI (AP)—A Cuban exile group claimed today it captured valuable documents aboard the Cuban freighter Maria Teresa after dynamiting the vessel in Montreal harbor yesterday.

"We will soon make these documents public if that will help the cause of Cuban liberation," said Felipe Rivero, head of the Nationalist Association, and anti-Castro organization.

Montreal police said there was an explosion at the freighter's pier but there was no damage.

Rivero said the attack by commandos of his organization "marks the start of a series of chain actions which will cease only after Cuba is completely free and sovereign."

Another exile group Accion Cuba, also claimed credit for the attack.

In Havana, Prime Minister Fidel Castro demanded a full investigation by Canadian police. The Communist leader blamed the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency for the incident.
