Bazooka Plot Born in Morn

The three anti-Castro Cubans accused of lobbing a rocket at UN headquarters on Dec. 11, while Ernesto (Che) Guevara, Cuba's No. 2 man, was blasting the U. S. before the Security Council, put their plot in motion during the early morning of that day, police said yesterday.

The defendants were arraigned before Queens Criminal Court Judge Samuel J. Ohringer on a short affidavit by Detective William Reilly of the Long Island City station

The explosion took place at 12:10 P.M., nearly 10 hours after its conception.

The accused, who surrendered on Tuesday, were Carlos Perez, 31, of 247 Audubon Ave.; Ignacio Noya, 26, of 535 W. 50th St., and his brother, Guillermo, 25, of 1414 91st St., North Bergen, N. J., members of the Cuban Nationalist Association, an actionist group of Castro haters.

In a courtroom crowded with police, as well as relatives and friends of the prisoners, Ohringer fixed bond at \$5,000 each pending a hearing Jan. 6.

Ohringer eventually set bail at

\$2,500 on two-felony charges: endangering life maliciously by placing explosives near a building and attempting to damage a building, and \$2,500 on the misdemeanor charge of conspiring to commit those offenses.

Fees for obtaining professional bond amounted to \$231 each, and the men were jailed while their families sought to raise the money.
