

The Ku-Klux in Georgia.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Witnesses from Georgia were examined by the Ku-Klux Committee today. C. D. Foreyth, Solicitor for the Rome Judicial Circuit, testified that he had convicted three men, worthless vagabonds, who in disguise had robbed persons on the highway. It was sometimes with difficulty that he could convict such offenders, owing to public sentiment and fear on the part of the jury. He believed there was a Ku-Klux organization, but could not tell their designs and purposes further than what they had shown by their acts. One of the men whom he had convicted confessed that he was a member of an association having signs and pass-words, and that he was under obligations to obey orders.
